



HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE IN FLOODS 2022

Pakistan declared national climate emergency, amidst torrential monsoon rains wreaking havoc across the country, particularly in Balochistan, Sindh and South Punjab province. With over a third of the country under water, the climate change induced sea level rise and heavy downpour caused deadly flash floods. This unprecedented calamity claimed thousands of lives and damaged critical infrastructure. The country's agricultural heartland had also been

devastated with rice, corn and wheat crops destroyed by floods, causing huge economic losses. Amid this crisis, HDF responded with utmost compassion, extending emergency aid to the shattered communities. Our commitment, however, extended beyond immediate relief, sparking a comprehensive rehabilitation program, aimed at rebuilding lives upended by disaster.


01 GOVT. PRIMAY SCHOOL RESTORED

The school stood abandoned for too long, its walls and roof cracked and washrooms unusable, extensive damage inflicted by the devastating floods of 2022. But HDF undertook the responsibility to bring the out-of-school boys back to learning and growing. The damaged building was demolished and a new one room school structure was constructed. The toilet, hand washing area and boundary wall were also renovated. The school has been restored and the children of Meer Deenar Khan Brohi are building themselves a prosperous future again.



October 19, 2023: We marked the **Handing Over Ceremony** of newly reconstructed homes and a restored government primary school in Meer Deenar Khan Brohi.

The event was graced by Commissioner Larkana, Mr. Abdul Waheed Shaikh, Deputy Commissioner Jacobabad, Mr. Dadlo Zohrani, Assistant Commissioner Jacobabad, Mr. Zakir Ali Kakar, and other esteemed guests. The presence of District line department officials, NGO representatives, District Manager and the resilient beneficiaries from Meer Deenar Khan Brohi transformed this ceremony into a beacon of hope and revival within the affected communities.



REHABILITATION UNDERWAY IN MOULA BUX BROHI:

HDF has undertaken an admirable initiative by further constructing homes for the displaced communities residing in the small village of Moula Bux Brohi, Jacobabad. These homes will not only offer immediate physical shelter but also bring back a sense of normalcy to their disrupted lives. The construction process prioritizes quality materials and sustainable design, ensuring the longevity and resilience of these new structures.

Recognizing the importance of community engagement and

empowerment, HDF has been actively organizing meetings with the local residents. These dialogues foster a sense of ownership and collaboration, ensuring the project's long-term sustainability and success. Marking a significant milestone, the reconstruction of the first 20 houses commenced in November 2023, representing the beginning of a larger rehabilitation effort. Witnessing the tangible progress on the ground has instilled hope and optimism within the affected families.





CLEAN WATER PROVISION IN NOOR MUHAMMAD PATHAN:


HDF successfully installed a solar-operated RO water filtration plant in village Noor Muhammad Pathan, Jacobabad. The plant was

BEYOND THE FLOOD ABDUL GHANI'S

TALE OF COMMUNITY RESURGENCE

One of the inspiring stories that emerged from the crisis of floods 2022 was that of Abdul Ghani, a resident of Meer Deenar Khan Brohi, Jacobabad. Together with his wife, Naziran, and their seven children, they found themselves at the center of the disaster. As a tenant farmer, Abdul Ghani saw not only his farmlands but also the foundations of his livelihood swept away by the floods. Driven by the fear for their lives, they had no choice but to relocate their family to the raised metal road in their village to escape the relentless floodwaters. Their makeshift homes bore the brunt of the calamity, being left in shambles with the walls torn down.

When all seemed lost, HDF offered salvation by rehabilitating survivors like Abdul Ghani.

Recognizing his resolve and determination to aid his community, Abdul Ghani was appointed as the President of the Village Development Organization (VDO) by HDF. He became the driving force of our mission, helping us engage the locals and empower them in their journey towards recovery.

"HDF stepped in when no one else came to our aid," he recalls.


Today, Meer Deenar Khan Brohi stands transformed with 35 houses rebuilt, offering not just shelter but hope and sanctuary to the entire community. Abdul Ghani, now in his new home with his family, embodies the spirit of a fresh start.

In the face of calamity, Abdul Ghani's story echoes the strength that emerges when communities unite to rise above adversity with the right support. Together, through the power of community partnership, HDF is not only rebuilding homes but also rebuilding dreams.



He expresses his gratitude:

During the floods, we were left homeless, some were living along roadsides and others elsewhere. Today, all the houses have been successfully reconstructed. We are immensely thankful to HDF for providing us with the means to work for ourselves."





HDF MODEL VILLAGES:

TOWARDS HOLISTIC DEVELOPMENT

Following the floods of 2010, HDF undertook the pioneering initiative of developing Model Villages to rehabilitate and mobilize communities in the disaster-struck regions of Pakistan. Employing a holistic approach, HDF's Model Villages address a multitude of community needs, aimed at providing social mobilization, livelihood and food security, education, health services, WASH (water, sanitation and

hygiene), sustainable environment, and climate resilient housing. These model villages encompass Village Development Organizations (VDOs), Community Health Centres (CHCs), paved streets, water filtration plants, covered drains, solid waste management systems, community centres and ring embankments around the village to protect from future floods.

At the remarkable age of eighty-five, Malik Khair Muhammad (late), a distinguished resident of village Kufri, Siddiqueabad in Soon Valley, District Khushab, Punjab, leaves behind an enduring legacy of unwavering dedication to community service. Retiring as a District Education Officer (DEO), his influence resonates through the countless students whose lives he touched, propelling them towards success in fields such as medicine, engineering, the military, entrepreneurship, politics and social leadership. Malik Khair Muhammad's commitment extended beyond education, as he became a pivotal force in various community development projects, earning the respect of his entire community for his adept mediation in family disputes.

When HDF established its office in the Soon Valley and embarked on climate-smart development projects, Malik Khair Muhammad provided valuable insights regarding the region's most pressing issues. He played a crucial role in selecting the site for HDF's Afaf Dam by venturing across the valley's challenging terrain alongside HDF's Area Manager, despite the difficulties posed by his advanced age.

In recognition of his unparalleled influence in his community and his dedication to positive social change, Malik Khair Muhammad was appointed as the President of the Siddique Abad Village Development Organization (VDO) by HDF. Under his astute guidance,


the construction of the Afaf Dam became a resounding success, transforming it into a symbol of community resilience.

He has championed HDF's mission to empower and mobilize the communities to take control of their own development by rallying the Soon Valley residents and the necessary funds for the construction of a vital 1.5 km long track leading to Afaf Dam. This project has greatly reduced travel times for the villagers and transformed Afaf Dam into a popular scenic spot for locals and tourists alike.

The people of the Soon Valley express their heartfelt gratitude to HDF for the transformative initiatives spearheaded by Malik Khair Muhammad, including the Afaf Dam and the upcoming healthcare center in Naushera. His support for HDF's mission has undeniably brought profound and positive changes to the lives of the valley's residents.

Malik Khair Muhammad passed away on December 21, 2023 but his legacy of service and leadership will forever be etched in the hearts of those he inspired and the people he uplifted. HDF pays tribute to his indomitable spirit, tireless efforts and invaluable contributions to the success of climate-smart initiatives in the valley. HDF honors Malik Khair Muhammad for his enduring impact and extends heartfelt condolences to his family and the Soon Valley community. May his

HDF'S IMPACTFUL PRESENCE AT PEDRR 2023





HDF solidified its position as a leading humanitarian organization at Pakistan's first-ever Expo on Disaster Risk Reduction (PEDRR 2023). Hosted from 16th to 18th August 2023 by the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) of Pakistan in collaboration with the National Disaster Risk Management Fund (NDRMF), the event brought together key stakeholders in disaster management, including individuals, UN organizations, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), military responders, private sector entities and

diplomatic communities, providing them a platform for collaboration

HDF's stall at the Expo served as a platform to showcase our notable disaster relief contributions, such as during critical events of 2005 earthquakes, 2010 and 2022 floods. These instances underscored our rapid response capabilities as well as our dedication to aid affected

communities in times of crisis.

HDF went beyond immediate relief, emphasizing our broader focus on sustainable development. Our climate-resilient initiatives in the Soon Valley region took center stage. The construction of the Afaf Dam, addressing both floods and droughts, exemplified HDF's proactive approach to disaster preparedness. Our commitment to environmental challenges like deforestation and carbon emissions was evident through our olive plantation projects. Additionally, HDF's focus on ecotourism and conservation of Ramsar Sites highlighted a forward-looking approach to climate financing through carbon credits. This holistic approach to our climate-smart project in Soon Valley successfully showcased our goal of achieving environment sustainability as well as supporting the local communities and fostering economic growth.



HDF actively engaged with prominent figures like Lt. Gen. Inam Haider Malik, Chairman NDMA, Senator Taj Haider, and Raja Pervaiz Ashraf, Speaker of the National Assembly. Their appreciation and applause further solidified HDF's reputation as a leading humanitarian force.

Under the joint efforts of the Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) and the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), a significant Group Discussion on "Outlook of National DRR Efforts in **Pakistan"** was held which aimed to provide a comprehensive review of Pakistan's disaster risk reduction (DRR) policies and practices. The discussion sought to analyze the nation's progress, challenges, and efforts in the context of the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015–2030. Furthermore, it aimed to delve into the insights provided by Pakistan's Voluntary National Review (VNR) report on the

Sendai Framework, submitted to and published by the United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNDRR). CEO HDF, Mr. Mehboob UI Haq's valuable insights, derived from HDF's extensive experience, contributed to the national conversation on strengthening disaster risk reduction capacity and building resilience, especially in the wake of the recent floods.

PEDRR2023 provided an essential platform for stakeholders in the disaster management field to connect, collaborate and share insights. By showcasing HDF's multifaceted approach, strategic engagement and valuable contributions to national dialogue, we reaffirmed our position as a leading humanitarian organization committed to building a more resilient and prepared Pakistan.

HDF SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS FOR FUTURE LEADERS

HDF is striving to provide quality education for all, especially the disadvantaged, ensuring that all out-of-school children are able to attend and learn in schools. Our Scholarship Programs are aimed at alleviating the financial burdens on the marginalized individuals for whom economic barriers are making education inaccessible. Through these scholarships, we have catered to the financial needs of several bright and deserving students, supporting them in their academic endeavors and helping them fulfill their dreams.





HDF Scholarship is a performance-based scholarship initiated by Pakistani diaspora residing in the U.S. who wanted to pay back to the country by offering financial assistance to deserving and promising students. HDF has disbursed HDF Scholarships among deserving

students from different educational institutions across various regions in Pakistan. Without such support, it would not have been possible for these extraordinary students to continue their academic journeys.







Dr. Abdus Salam Scholarship is a merit-based scholarship, open to bright science students currently in grades IX and X. Established by HDF Canada, the scholarship provides financial support for two years, distributed quarterly. Since its inception, the program has empowered numerous talented students to successfully complete

their matriculation, opening doors to promising future opportunities in the field of science. It serves as a vital tool to aid deserving students, promoting equitable access to quality education and fostering the next generation of scientific minds.

The scholarship disburses financial assistance directly to the recipients, enabling them to

overcome financial hurdles and pursue their educational aspirations in science. By nurturing these bright minds, the scholarship program envisions them as future catalysts for driving socio-economic progress within society.







Orphan Support Program supports orphans and mothers under its paradigm. With generous support from Danish Muslim Aid (DM-AID), orphans are supported with DK (Danish Krona) 3000 per orphan, easing their financial burdens and allowing them to work towards a bright future through education and learning.






NURTURING AYESHA'S JOURNEY TO MOTHERHOOD

Ayesha's story unfolds against the backdrop of a stark reality faced by many mothers in Pakistan. The country grapples with concerning rates of maternal and child malnutrition, fueled by limited access to nutritious food, inadequate awareness and deeply ingrained cultural practices.

Amidst these challenges, Ayesha Jahangir, a young mother of two from Karol War village in Lahore, found herself navigating a difficult second pregnancy. Ayesha's husband, a daily wage laborer in the masonry trade, works tirelessly to provide for his family. However, his limited income made it incredibly difficult to afford a healthy and diverse diet for Ayesha, especially during her critical pregnancy period. Anemia and a previous surgery to remove a dermoid ovarian cyst further compounded her health challenges, significantly increasing the risk of complications for both Ayesha and her unborn child.

Recognizing Ayesha's situation, our health worker promptly identified her needs and referred her to the HDF Community Health Center (CHC) in Karolwar. HDF provided Ayesha with the vital support she desperately needed. Throughout her pregnancy, she was given valuable guidance and essential food supplements, ensuring she received the necessary nutrients for both her own well-being and the healthy development of her baby. This comprehensive care, coupled with regular check-ups, culminated in a joyous outcome: the safe delivery of a healthy baby girl.

But HDF's care continues. Understanding the significance of crucial "1000 Days" window for optimal child development, we continue to support Ayesha with vital food supplements during her lactation period. This ongoing assistance paves the way for her child's long-term health and cognitive growth, offering a glimmer of hope in her fight against undernutrition.

Today, both Ayesha and her daughter are thriving. The baby receives all scheduled immunizations at the HDF CHC, guaranteeing optimal protection against vaccine-preventable diseases.

Ayesha's story beautifully exemplifies the transformative power of accessible and holistic healthcare. Her journey not only highlights the significant impact of HDF's interventions but also underscores the importance of prioritizing mother and child nutrition, as a national imperative. By ensuring proper maternal and child nutrition, we can collectively work towards nurturing a healthier future generation for Pakistan.

80% of learning for children up to the age of 12 is visual. Yet, about **4 million children** in Pakistan suffer from visual impairment. The Nazar 20/20 program at HDF is a dedicated eye screening initiative that is helping students fight visual learning disabilities since 2019. Motivated by his son's 1st-grade eye exam in U.S.A, Mr. Saqlain Khan

(late) transformed a personal concern into a nationwide initiative. Born in Pakistan without school vision checks, his passion led to Nazar 20/20, a program that is addressing this gap by providing eye exams and corrective glasses to students and teachers across Pakistan.

Eyes are a precious gift from GOD and I might have lost mine if the Nazar 20/20 team hadn't detected my vision problem in time. HDF has done a great service to children like me and I am immensely grateful.

Grappling with poor eyesight since childhood, Atooba Shahzad, a 14-year-old student at the HDF Secondary School in Ainu Bhatti, Lahore, could never afford a visit to an eye specialist due to her family's humble background. Her weakening eyesight had started affecting her studies and causing her frequent headaches until the Nazar 20/20 team, as part of HDF's initiative, arrived at the school to conduct eye check-ups for all the students in 2019.

These screenings shed light on many students suffering from vision impairment, startling the school staff, the parents and even many of the children themselves who had been unaware of these eye issues. Atooba Shahzad was among those students identified as needing immediate attention and she was provided with the necessary prescription glasses by the Nazar 20/20 team.

Today, Atooba has been given the gift of clear vision. She can now see perfectly in the classroom, read from the whiteboard and engage with her studies without any hindrance. Thanks to the timely intervention and support from HDF's Nazar 20/20 team, Atooba has overcome her visual impairments and is leading a fulfilling life, focusing on her education and a brighter future ahead. She credits her transformation to HDF and Nazar 20/20.



COMMEMORATING WORLD SIGHT DAY 2023



HDF highlighted the significance of World Sight Day at a seminar hosted by the **Pakistan Institute of Rehabilitation Sciences (PIRS).** The profound impact of HDF's Nazar 20/20 program through the years, dedicated to fighting visual learning disabilities among students, was celebrated with enthusiasm. HDF and PIRS share a

long-standing commitment to this vital cause. This ongoing partnership, established in 2021, focuses on screening and improving the visual health of school children across Pakistan. The event celebrated the transformative power of vision and the collective efforts of HDF and PIRS in making a lasting difference.



Embracing the theme "Love Your Eyes at Work," HDF staff also celebrated World Sight Day. Commemorative glasses, distributed among staff, served as a tangible reminder of the importance of eye health awareness and appreciating the gift of sight in all everything

we do. Through this initiative, HDF emphasized the crucial role of eye health and also fostered internal awareness for a healthier and more visually empowered future.



IMPROVING ACCESS TO SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES FOR CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENT GIRLS IN GAGRA, BUNER, KPK AN HDF AND USAID NPI EXPAND PARTNERSHIP





HDF has been successfully running a large-scale student-centered School Health Program since its inception, a key component of which caters to children, especially adolescent girls. In July 2022, under the auspices of U.S. Agency for International Development – USAID's New

Partnerships Initiative (NPI EXPAND), HDF launched a comprehensive school health program to improve **health**, **hygiene and nutrition** among the school children and adolescent girls in tehsil Gagra, district Buner, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) province.

Our holistic school health program screened over

25,000 students

for ear, eye and overall health conditions, and provided immediate intervention or referral to specialized hospitals.

Iron/IFA

supplements and vitamins were provided to anemic children and adolescent girls to improve their immunity and protect them from chronic illnesses.



BREAKING SILENCE ON MENSTRUAL HEALTH

In Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's District Buner, menstrual health management (MHM) was once shrouded in silence and taboos. Girls navigated their first periods without knowledge, leaving them confused and ashamed. The lack of open dialogue hindered girls from embracing their womanhood with confidence.

A student of Class 8th from GGMS Bajkata, while reflecting on her first menstrual experience shared,

When I first got my periods, I was at my relative's place. I was very scared and started crying because I didn't know what was happening to me. My cousin then told me about menstruation, or 'chutti' as we call it. I was still confused and couldn't ask for more details because I felt ashamed and had so many questions in my mind. I wondered if this would happen every day and if it was some kind of illness."

> HDF launched the 'AGAH Campaign' to address the lack of knowledge and pervasive stigma surrounding MHM as part of the NPI Expand USAID funded project 'Improving access to school health services for children and adolescent girls in Tehsil Gagra, District Buner.'





The campaign was merely about not disseminating information; it was a seismic shift in attitudes and behaviors, a rebellion against the status quo. Formerly hesitant girls started seeking guidance and sharing experiences fearlessly. Inspired by the sessions, a 9th-grade girl at GGHS Rega discussed her issue of irregular periods with her teacher. This shift from shyness to empowerment indicated the campaign's success in breaking down stigmas and fostering trust and support among students.

> In GGHSS-Shalbandi, a first-year student shared,

After the last MHM session, I talked to my sister about it and explained that it's perfectly fine to take a bath during periods. I also shared with her what the doctor told us, which is that eating healthy food during this time is important. We should have fruits, vegetables, meat, eggs and milk to make up for the iron that we lose during menstruation."

The AGAH campaign, like a ripple in a pond, reached 3,000 adolescent girls across 18 Buner schools, arming these young minds with the knowledge to navigate their menstrual health and embrace their future without constraints. The impact of HDF extends far beyond the classrooms, breaking the silence with a chorus of voices advocating for change.







Bringing CLEAN WATER and Renewed Smiles to Nowshera

For years, the residents of Village Khorabad, Nowshera, KP, endured the bitter taste in every sip of water. The seepage of sewage into their underground water source rendered it undrinkable and unusable for

cooking and other purposes. With no access to clean water, the 360 households and 2,880 vulnerable individuals faced health challenges and a sense of hopelessness.

Saba Gul, a mother of four, watched helplessly as her children's teeth deteriorated due to the contaminated water. "We couldn't even use this water for drinking and cooking. All the teeth of my young children had been damaged," she shared with sorrow, looking over at

her young girls who had lost confidence in their smiles.

With the benevolent support of our valued donors Seattle Chapter, HDF intervened, swiftly implementing a Solar-Operated Ultra Water Filtration Plant. With the filtration plant in place, residents now experience improved health. The unpleasant taste and odor of the water are replaced by clean, safe water. Daily activities like cooking and making tea have become joyful rituals once again.

"We are grateful to HDF for providing clean drinking water," exclaims Saba as she hands fresh, clean water from HDF Water Filtration Plant to her daughter; the joy in her voice reflecting the newfound confidence in her family.





REVIVING RO WATER FILTRATION PLANTS IN THARPARKAR

Access to clean drinking water remains a significant challenge in Tharparkar, Sindh. Previously installed Reverse Osmosis water filtration plants by the Sindh Government, intended to address this issue but had fallen into disrepair due to operational and maintenance difficulties. Recognizing this critical need, HDF stepped forward in February 2022 by signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the **Sindh Public Health Engineering Department (PHED).** Through this collaborative effort, HDF adopted 100 non-functional RO plants, primarily located in Taluka of Dali and Chachro, and aimed to revitalize them. Each of these plants boasts a production capacity of **10,000 gallons** of clean drinking water per day, holding immense potential to improve the lives of residents.

Rather than investing in entirely new infrastructure, HDF focused on

repairing and maintaining existing RO plants. This approach not only reduced the initial financial burden but also ensured the existing infrastructure was utilized to its full potential. Following a meticulous in-house assessment, 10 RO plants were selected for the initial phase, with repair work commencing in May 2022.

The success of this initiative is evident in the handover ceremony held in July 2023 at Mehran Hotel, Karachi. During this event, 09 rehabilitated RO plants were handed over to the Sindh Government. This signifies a critical milestone, directly impacting vulnerable households in Tharparkar. The project's impact extends beyond immediate access to clean water. It paves the way for improved health outcomes and overall well-being for residents, particularly children and vulnerable populations.



HDF was instrumental in making the Afaf Dam a reality, ushering in prosperity and more effective water resource management for the Soon Valley community. Now, we have also successfully empowered the local community to take charge of a vital road development project leading to the dam.

The community has independently funded the construction of a 1.5 km track from the dam to Jhalar Moor, under the leadership of

President VDO Retired Head Master M. Khair Muhammad. This noteworthy project was completed on **September 10, 2023.** With a significant reduction in distance by 20 km, this newly accessible track promises to improve access to the dam for both locals and tourists alike.

HDF commends the community for its self-initiative and is honored to have played a pivotal role in their journey towards progress.



REFORESTING WITH OLIVE CULTIVATION:



Soon Valley, with its unique soil and climate, serves as an ideal location for cultivating olive, holding the promise of transformation into a thriving agricultural hub while also fostering local economic development, promoting environmental sustainability and addressing deforestation.

HDF and CIHEAM Bari, an inter-governmental organization headquartered in Italy, signed an LoU for bringing forth HDF's vision of climate-resilient olive plantation in Soon Valley. Being our esteemed technical partner, CIHEAM Bari will support us in area selection, olive variety choice, farmer training and empowering women and youth through income generation activities.

Through sustainable agricultural practices, we have piloted the project with acquisition of 10 acres of land. **2000 olive plants** of Arbequina and Coratina (BARI-1) variety have been meticulously

cultivated after extensive soil testing, following the recommendations of CIHEAM Bari. These plantations are projected to bear fruit in about *2 to 3 years*.

HDF's reforestation initiative aims for plantation on 1200 acres of land in the valley with the following impact aims:

- Transform Soon Valley into a thriving agriculture hub
- Enhance local economy and livelihoods
- ✓ Provide opportunities for value addition

Contribute to biodiversity conservation

- Cultivate olive, peach, and blueberry orchards for sustainable income sources
- Mitigating deforestation and sequestering carbon emissions in the environment
- Create a green and healthier ecosystem while promoting environmental sustainability



COMBATING CLIMATE CHANGE IMPACTS WITH ECO-FRIENDLY STOVES:

HDF aims to revolutionize the lives of 1200 families in Soon Valley by introducing efficient, eco-friendly mud and lime cookstoves. These innovative stoves:

Conserve Forests: Use agricultural waste instead of firewood, preserving the valley's rich forest cover.

Reduce Smoke: Improved chimney design minimizes indoor air pollution and smoke-related hazards, leading to reduced carbon emissions as well as respiratory, lung and heart issues prevalent in women, children and people with pre-existing health conditions.


Disaster-Ready: Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) compliant design, built to withstand floods, earthquakes.

User-Friendly: Easy to repair, allowing beneficiaries to handle plaster damage themselves, ensuring the stove's longevity and resilience.

Offer Sustainability: It is both rapidly renewable and easily recyclable, offering cost-effective and eco-friendly solutions.

Eco-Friendly Stove Design:

- Constructed using sun-dried mud bricks and lime render for added strength
- Mud plaster is mixed with straw and cow dung for durability
- functionality during floods and emergencies
- Air regulation pipe transfers heat from the first stove to the second, allowing cooking with a single fire
- ✓ Incorporated chimney emits smoke only when the fire is lit and at a higher level, reducing indoor pollution compared to traditional stoves



RESTORATION OF RAMSAR SITES:

Soon Valley proudly hosts several Ramsar Sites, notably the Uchali Complex - comprising three lakes; Uchali, Khabeki, and Jahlar, respectively. These lakes are internationally recognized for their ecological significance and provide critical habitats for a diverse range of flora and fauna, primarily migratory birds.

HDF is committed to restoring these ecosystems to ensure their lasting sustainability by safeguarding these Ramsar Sites, nesting in the heart of Soon Valley. We will actively contribute by restoring the biodiversity with the plantation of native flora. To safeguard these invaluable ecosystems, we will establish clear boundaries and work tirelessly to advocate against illegal hunting and poaching, which pose significant threats to the local wildlife at Ramsar Sites.

Simultaneously, we are strongly focused on promoting eco-tourism in the region. This involves a multifaceted approach, involving wetland awareness in schools, arranging guided tours and sightseeing trips, and inviting visitors to witness the natural wonders that thrive in the valley. These experiences include bird watching, serene lake views, opportunities to feed the fish, photography, off-site camping and catching fireflies in the forest.

By engaging the local community and promoting livelihoods through eco-tourism, we aim to create a sense of ownership of these natural assets among the residents. In doing so, we not only preserve the natural beauty of Soon Valley but also safeguard the delicate balance of its ecosystems for future generations to enjoy.

In pursuit of a sustainable future, HDF spearheaded a thought-provoking Round Table Discussion on "Small Dams in Pakistan: Combating Climate Change Impact and Enhancing Water Resilience." Convened at the Institute of Regional Studies on May 30th, 2023, the event brought together leading minds from diverse public and private organizations to collectively explore solutions for building climate-resilient communities with a focus on Soon Valley.

The discussion served as a springboard for introducing HDF's transformative initiatives in Soon Valley and fostering potential

collaborations for a more sustainable future. Expert panelists delved into the multifaceted potential of small dams, highlighting their ability to enhance water conservation efforts, mitigate flood and drought risks, promote biodiversity, and enhance agriculture and livelihoods as well. The crucial role of community engagement and empowerment was also signified, underlining the need for understanding local needs and involving the community in ensuring project ownership and long-term sustainability.

The discussion further explored the significance of strategic plantation initiatives and eco-conservation efforts in Soon Valley.



Conducting land assessments, selecting climate-resilient crops, and adopting modern irrigation systems for optimal resource utilization was greatly emphasized. Olive cultivation was recognized for its ability to combat poverty, water scarcity, and climate change impacts, with the potential for further commercialization through advanced technology and value chain development. In a unanimous accord, the focus shifted to prioritizing forest conservation. Ramsar sites in Soon Valley, steeped in history, were acknowledged as invaluable treasures and suggestions were made to promote biodiversity conservation and ecotourism in areas. Assessments to determine ideal flora and fauna introductions were considered significant in the process. The initiatives' potential for generating

carbon credits, a valuable global carbon market commodity, was mutually agreed upon.

It was not just a day of dialogue and theoretical discussions, but a call to action and an invitation to turn these transformative ideas into tangible realities. Mr. Mehboob Ul Haq, CEO HDF, extended an invitation to the esteemed representatives present to join forces in realizing the vision of a Climate-Smart Soon Valley. The event fostered promising opportunities for future collaborations with organizations like the Ministry of Water Resources, GCISE, WWF, Climate Chain Consulting, IUCN, and PET.



EXPANDING THE HDF GIRLS HIGH SCHOOL IN GURDAS



GURDAS, MARDAN, KHYBER PAKHTUNKHWA PROVINCE, PAKISTAN

Established in June 2009 with the support of a dedicated U.S. based donor, HDF Girls High School in Gurdas was designed to accommodate 300 students from nursery to 8th grade. HDF has achieved a 65% enrollment rate for girls in all its schools, with HDF Girls High School in Gurdas empowering more girls in the area than ever before. However, due to the absence of nearby government schools and the quality education provided by HDF, coupled with scholarship opportunities, the enrollment rate has surged. Now, hosting 410 students, both primary and secondary sections operate beyond capacity.

Our Challenges:

- ✓ Lack of necessary space for conducting classrooms
- Lack of essential facilities: computer lab, science lab, library, staff room All open school spaces turned into makeshift classrooms
- Extreme weather, like heat or rain, often makes outdoor study infeasible
- Inability to register with the Private School Regulatory Authority (PSRA) up to 10th grade (sophomore year), leading to matric exams being conducted under the name "HDF Secondary School, Saeed Abad"



Our Solution:

The proposed solution to address the challenges faced by HDF Girls High School, Gurdas, involves the construction of a new building in close proximity to the current school.

10,890 sq. ft. plot identified and secured with the support of local community

Impact:

- ✓ Establishment of fully equipped science and computer labs
- ✓ Separate classrooms for each grade
- Provision of essential facilities including a library and sports amenities

In the upcoming year, we are committed to expanding our facilities to ensure quality education for even more girls.

BUILDING A HEALTHIER FUTURE IN KHENWARI WITH OGDCL

In 2024, HDF is looking forward to a collaborative effort with the Oil and Gas Development Company Limited (OGDCL) to establish a state-of-the-art Mother and Child Healthcare Centre (MCHC) in Khenwari, Sindh. This project will directly address the critical healthcare needs of the community, particularly for mothers and children, who currently face limited access to medical services and a high prevalence of preventable diseases. INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF HUMAN DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the annexed financial statements of Human Development Foundation (the Company), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2023 and the statement of income and expenditure, the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in general fund, the statement of cash flows for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements, including material accounting policy information and other explanatory information, and we state that we have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of our knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purposes of the audit.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the statement of financial position, the statement of income and expenditure, the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in general fund and the statement of cash flows together with the notes forming part thereof confirm with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan and give the information required by the Companies Act, 2017 (XIX of 2017), in the manner so required and respectively give a true and fair view of the state of the Company's affairs as at December 31, 2023 and of the surplus, the comprehensive income, the changes in general fund and its cash flows for the year then ended.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (the Code) and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditors Report Thereon

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report but does not include the financial statements and our auditors report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.





In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and Board of Directors for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan and the requirements of Companies Act, 2017 (XIX of 2017) and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Board of directors is responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion.
